ACF Overview

- The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) is a division of the

 - Evaluations of existing programs and innovative approaches to helping low-income children and families
 - Descriptive and exploratory studies
 - Research syntheses
- OPRE also works to improve the quality, usefulness, interoperability, availability, and analysis
 of ACF data.
- OPRE conducts its research and evaluation work primarily through competitively awarded grants and contracts, and actively disseminates findings.






The Behavioral Interventions to Advance Self-Sufficiency (BIAS) Project

- Launched in 2010
- Sponsored by the Office of Planning, Research, and Evaluation in the Administration for Children and Families
- Led by MDRC, with partners
- Motivated by the question:
 - Can insights from behavioral science be used to improve the operations and efficacy
 of human services programs, and ultimately the well-being of low-income and
 vulnerable children, adults, and families?







Los Angeles TANF - Test




- An additional behavioral notice increased reengagement at 30 days by 3.6 percentage points
- This effect was largely driven by the loss-framed notice, which increased reengagement by 4.4 percentage points




BIAS Portfolio

3 domains, 7 states, 15 tests









BIAS Findings

- All sites saw a significant impact on at least one primary outcome of interest
- Impacts typically ranged from 2 to 4 percentage points, with some much larger
 - typical of this field
- Intervention costs were typically less than \$4 per program group member
- While the impacts from behavioral interventions were typically modest, they were also:
 - consistently achieved
 - very low-cost
 - scalable
 - small changes can add up





What's Next

BIAS Next Generation

- Building on lessons of BIAS and going beyond BIAS
- Working with additional ACF programs
- Moving beyond changing communications, greater emphasis on changing program and staff level processes and practices
